Dear Friends.

This year, the Colon Cancer Coalition continued work to get people screened. Through innovative new colonoscopy funds, targeted community messaging, and fitted community screening programs, we continue to seek out and overcome screening barriers.

With our signature Get Your Rear in Gear events, we expanded our direct local programming to four new states. The extent to which our volunteers and survivors work to ensure that no one has to go through a colorectal cancer diagnosis alone or at all continues to energize us.

In the words of a recent donor - I was diagnosed with colon cancer in 2018 at age 34 and am still doing chemotherapy. I want to support others fighting to live and help others not have to fight.

This year, we held our annual Living with Lynch summit in New York City. Always a favorite weekend, we brought Lynch families and GIs together to support, learn, and share with each other.

Colorectal cancer screening is changing with expanded prep options, improved and new colonoscopy tools for Gls, and non-invasive testing, including improved DNA, stool, and blood-based patient options. We believe these choices will close the screening gap, so we applaud our partners for putting colorectal cancer at the forefront.





TIME TOXICITY

Time toxicity is a hidden cancer burden to the patient and caregiver. The time spent undergoing medical care including tests, appointments, waiting time and travel can take overwhelm a patient and their caregiver. In 2023 we funded a Time Toxicity study done by Arjun Gupta that looks at what medical systems can do to increase quality of life of patients through more efficient and collaborative scheduling as well as increased use of virtual technologies.



BOSTON PUBLIC HEALTH

This March, the Boston Public Health Commission (BPHC) and the Colon Cancer Coalition have kicked off the next phase of a powerful partnership aimed at saving lives from colon cancer, particularly in high-risk communities of color. This phase amplifies vital messages in English, Haitian Creole, and Spanish — ensuring that more people have access to life-saving information.



The foundation for this campaign was laid in 2022 when BPHC and CCC conducted focus groups and interviews with community members to craft multilingual messages that truly resonate with those at high risk; including individuals with a family history of colon cancer.

Today, these impactful messages are visible across Boston — whether you're at an MBTA station, a bus stop, a community health center, or scrolling through social media. Each message proudly features a Boston resident, a true community champion, who shares their personal journey to underscore the critical importance of colon cancer screening and early detection. 
BLUE SPARK AWARD FEATURE

In 2023, we awarded Emily Darville and Kandice each a Blue Spark Award - a special Coalition award given to individuals going above and beyond and truly living the mission of this organization every day. As the first international Get Your Rear in Gear, the Nassau, Bahamas team entered year #2 of their event in 2023. Originally started by the late Andrea Darville, a 31 year old colon cancer patient who passed away mere weeks before the first race in 2022. Her sister, Emily, alongside local fundraising professional, Kandice Eldon, teamed up to carry on Andrea's legacy and her mission to "Paint the Bahamas blue".

In 2023, the Colon Cancer Coalition was pleased to donate a giant, inflatable colon to the Bahamas. Not only does this colon "live" in the capitol city of Nassau, but it is available for travel to the numerous Caribbean islands to promote education and awareness. After two successful years, the Colon Cancer Coalition, on behalf of Get Your Rear in Gear - Bahamas was pleased to present a check to local grant partner, the Cancer Society of the Bahamas in the amount of \$30,000. This large investment will allow Bahamians from all the islands to apply for financial assistance during colon cancer treatments. This \$30,000 was named in honor of Andrea's legacy, proudly having the name the "Blue Hope Fund." This fund has already assisted many individuals from main islands of Grand Bahama and New Providence but also the less populated areas of Eleuthera, Exuma and Andros.

We are proud as an organization to partner with Emily and her local team to make an impact in the Bahamas.





In March 2023 Get Your Rear in Gear - Philadelphia traded running shoes for dancing shoes and hosted the inaugural Runway for a Cure and Booty Ball. Featuring cancer thrivers, celebrating victoriously as they walked the runway, the message of the night was early screening saves lives.



Hosted by Beech Mountai Ski Resort, this annual fundraiser supports those battling colon cancer while raising awareness about colon cancer. Across multiple days, together we raised over \$100,000 with the Not so Gala, Gala on Friday and Runs for Buns on Saturday.





We gathered our local event directors, screening partners, board and staff for a weekend of advocacy, grassroots marketing, community outreach and impact training. We learned from partners about screening and prep options and how to best bring our mission to each community.



Living With LYNCH

Hosted in New York City by AliveAndKickn and the Colon Cancer Coalition, 2023 marked the 5th anniversary of the Living with Lynch advocacy weekend. We brought twelve Lynch-positive patients and a variety of medical experts together to empower patients Living with Lynch make informed decisions about their health and provide important information for others as they navigate the health needs of a Lynch syndrome diagnosis.
